Commonly Confused Words: Brake vs. Break

Brake and *break* sound alike, but their meanings are different.

Brake is often used as a noun meaning a device that stops movement. It may also be used as a verb meaning to stop movement.



Example 1: He put on the **brake** when he saw the tree in the road.

Example 2: She remembered to **brake** the car on the curve.

Break is a word with many meanings. It is often used as a verb it means to destroy, smash into pieces or put to an end. It may also be used as a noun to mean a short opening or a pause.

Example 1: He won't **break** her heart.

Example 2: Did you **break** your arm?

Example 2: The teacher will **break** up the fight.

Example 2: There was a **break** in the rain.

Example 2: Her snack **break** is in the afternoon.
