# Commonly Confused Words: Hear vs. Here

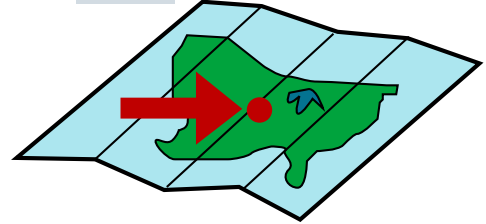


*Hear* and *Here* sound the same. However they have completely different meanings.

*Hear* is a verb meaning to process sound with the ears or to be informed.

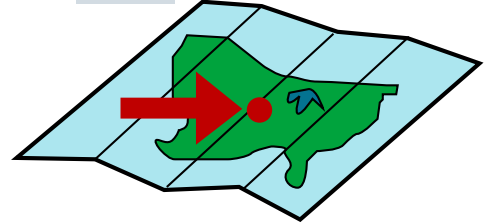
