## Commonly Confused Words: Past vs. Passed

*Past* and *passed* sound alike, but their meanings are different.

*Past* may be a noun meaning *a time gone by*. It may also be an adjective meaning *in a time before*. It can also be an adverb meaning *to go by*, or a preposition meaning *beyond*.
