

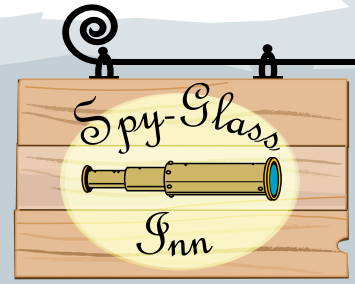
Treasure Island: Meet Long John Silver

2. This is the first time Jim meets Long John. Do you think Jim like him or dislikes him? Why? Use quotations from the passage to support your opinion.

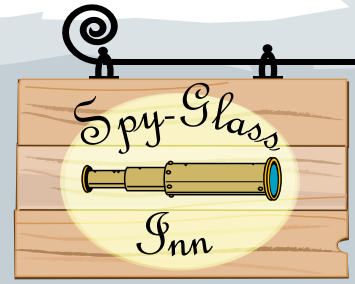
