



## After a Preposition: Who and Whom?

All pronouns that are the object of a preposition should be in the objective case.

**Example: Do you want to go with me?**

In the example *me* is the object of the preposition *with*. It would be incorrect to say “Do you want to go with I?”

The same rule applies for *who* and *whom*. *Whom* is the objective case.
