Commonly Confused Words: Cite vs. Sight vs. Site

Cite, *sight* and *site* sound alike, but their meanings are different.

Cite is a verb meaning to quote or to use as proof.

Example 1: To prove your point, you may **cite** experts.

Sight is a noun meaning the ability to see or a thing that is seen. It may also be a verb meaning to aim.

Example 1: He lost the **sight** in his left eye.

Example 2: The big dog was a common **sight** on the town's streets.

Example 3: When everyone is quiet, the archer will **sight** her target.

Site is a noun meaning a location or a website on the Internet.

Example 1: This was the **site** where the battle was fought.

Example 2: The club made a page on a social networking **site**.
