

Prepositional Phrases And Pronouns: Objective Case

Each prepositional phrase has a preposition and an object. If the object of the preposition is a pronoun, the pronoun is always in the objective case.

Correct: Do you want to go with me?

Incorrect: Do you want to go with I?

In the examples above, the preposition is *with*. The objective pronoun is *me*. The subjective pronoun is *I*. As the object of the preposition, the correct word to use is *me*.
