

Latin and Greek Prefixes: Mono- and Syn-

Many prefixes we use in English originally come from Greek or Latin words. The prefix *mono-* is from a Greek word meaning “single,” “alone” or “one.” The prefix *syn-* is from a Greek word meaning “together.” If you understand what the prefix means, it will help you understand the meaning of the whole word. For example, the root *rail* means “steel bar.” Combine *mono-* with *rail*, and it becomes the word *monorail*. Based on its original meaning, *monorail* means “one steel bar” or a train that runs on a single bar track.

Use the list in the bank to make five different English words out of *mono-* and *syn-*. You may add a suffix or change the spelling a little if needed. Write a sentence for each word you make and circle the word you made with the prefix. Be sure to use words for both *mono-* and *syn-*.
