

Latin and Greek Prefixes: Se- and Pro-

any prefixes we use in English originally come from Greek or Latin words. The prefix se- is from a Latin word meaning "apart." The prefix pro- is from a Latin word meaning "forward." If you understand what the prefix means, it will help you understand the meaning of the whole word. For example, the ending -clude means "to shut." Combine se- with -clude, and it becomes the word seclude. Based on its original meaning, seclude means "to shut apart" or keep away from other people.

Use the list in the bank to make five different English words out of *se*- and *pro*-. You may add a suffix or change the spelling a little if needed. Write a sentence for each word you make and circle the word you made with the prefix. Be sure to use words for both *se*- and *pro*-.


