

Latin and Greek Prefixes: Sub- and Ob-

Many prefixes we use in English originally come from Greek or Latin words. The prefix *sub-* is from Latin meaning “under” or “below.” The prefix *ob-* is from a Latin word meaning “against” or “across from.” If you understand what the prefix means, it will help you understand the meaning of the whole word. For example, the root *text* means “written work.” Combine *sub-* with *text*, and it becomes the word *subtext*. Based on its original meaning, *subtext* means “under a written work” or the deeper meaning of a written work such as a theme.

Use the list in the bank to make five different English words out of *sub-* and *ob-*. You may add a suffix or change the spelling a little if needed. Write a sentence for each word you make and circle the word you made with the prefix. Be sure to use words for both *sub-* and *ob-*.
