Many prefixes we use in English originally come from Greek or Latin words. The prefix *tele-* is from Greek meaning “distance.” The prefix *oct-/octo-* is from a Greek and a Latin word meaning “eight.” If you understand what the prefix means, it will help you understand the meaning of the whole word. For example, the root *gram* means “write” or “writing.” Combine *tele* with *gram*, and it becomes the word *telegram*. Based on its original meaning, *telegram* means “distance writing” or a message sent from a long distance.
