Sentence Diagramming: The Expletive There

In grammar an expletive, sometimes called a dummy subject, is a word that looks like the subject of a sentence, but instead has no real meaning. The most common expletive is *there*, and it is usually followed by a form of the verb *to be*. In sentence diagramming an expletive is placed above the subject with no connecting line.
