Keywords

Important words about the topic that stand out on the page, either in color, boldface or italic

Dolphins use **echolocation** to navigate through the ocean. They make **clicks** and **whistles** to bounce *sound waves* off of objects in the water. As the sound waves return, the dolphin hears it, possibly with its teeth.

Words at the top of the page that tell the first and last topic on the page

Baby Dolphins


A baby dolphin is called a calf. It drinks milk when it is young, just like a puppy, kitten, or baby human. A calf will stay near its mother for many months.



Timeline

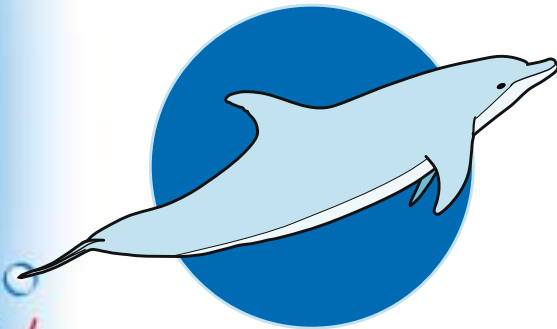
A line that shows the order that events happened in time

A phrase, sentence, or short paragraph that describes a picture.

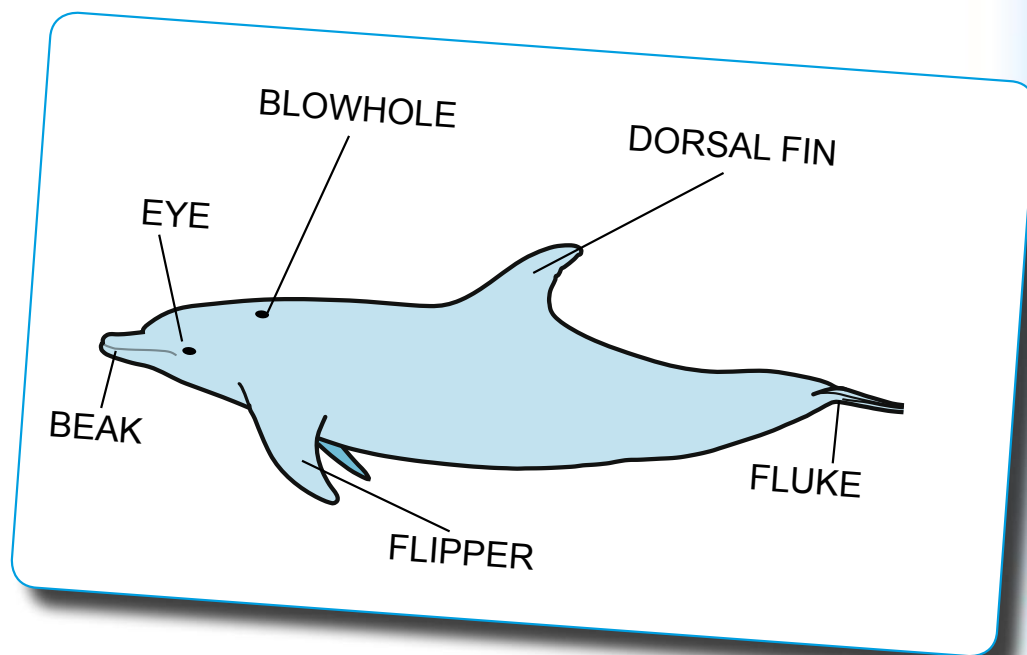

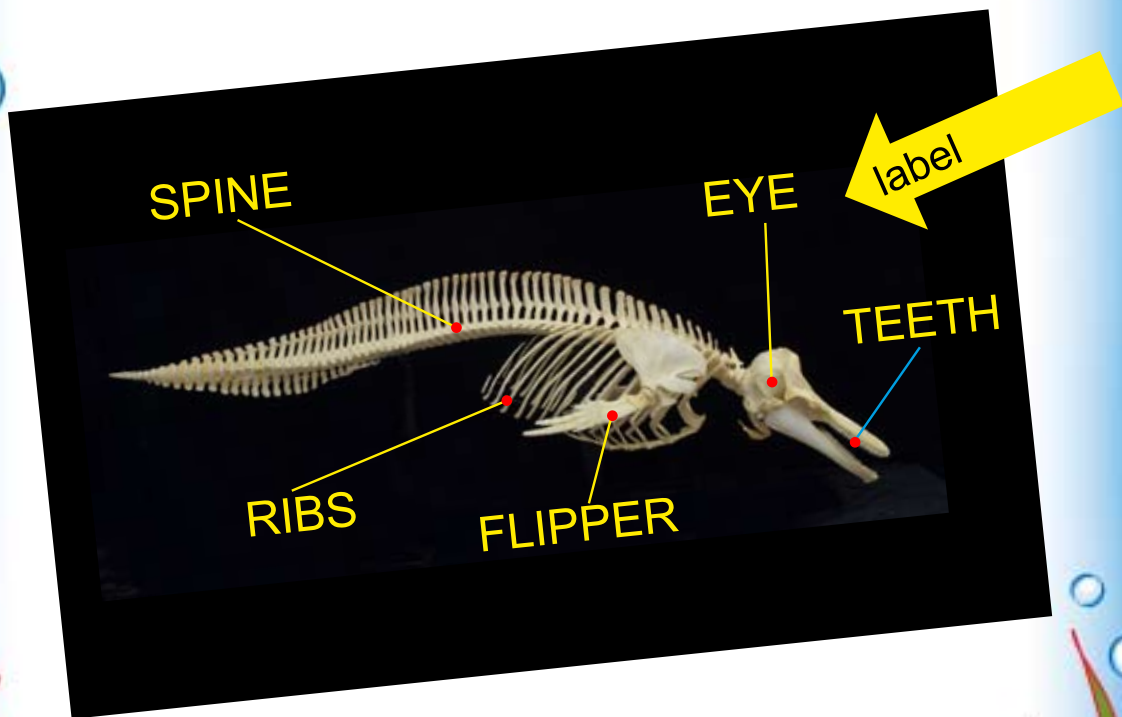
Diagrams

Labels

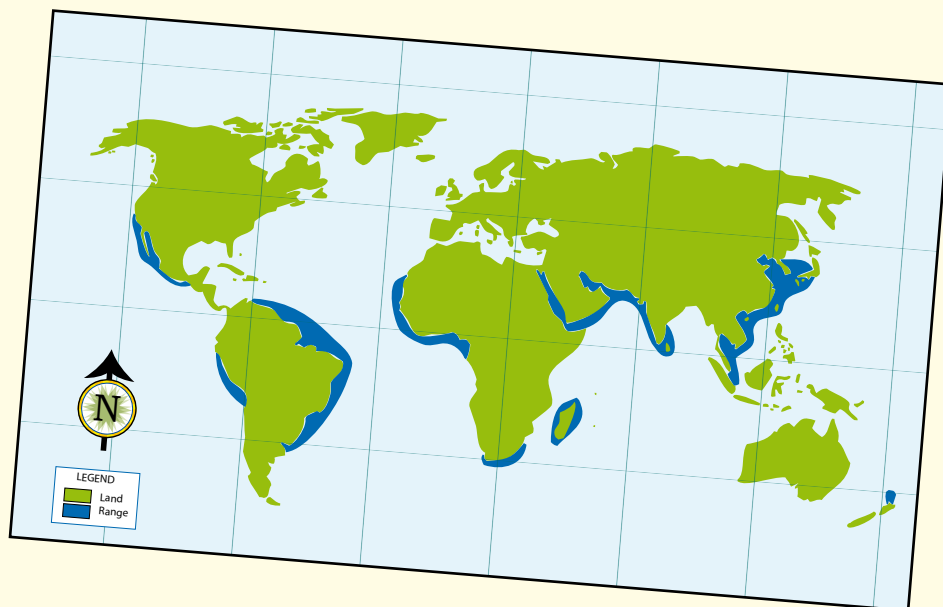
Words that identify the parts of a drawing or photograph.



Map

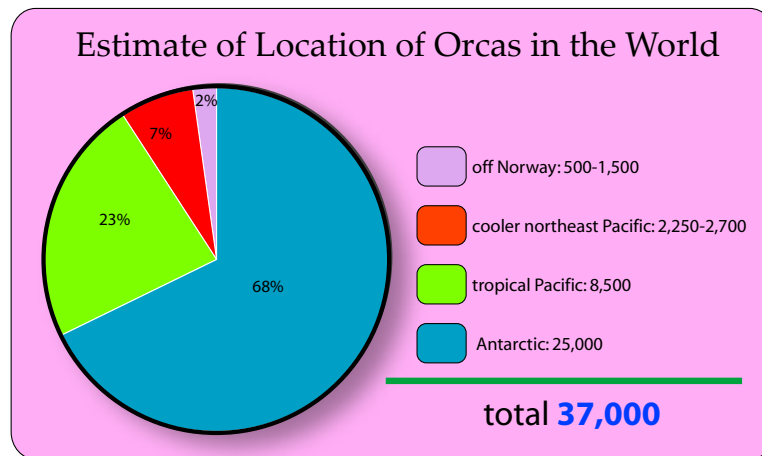
A drawing of an area; like land, oceans, or countries, that helps the reader understand where something happens

Areas Where the Long-Beaked Common Dolphin Lives

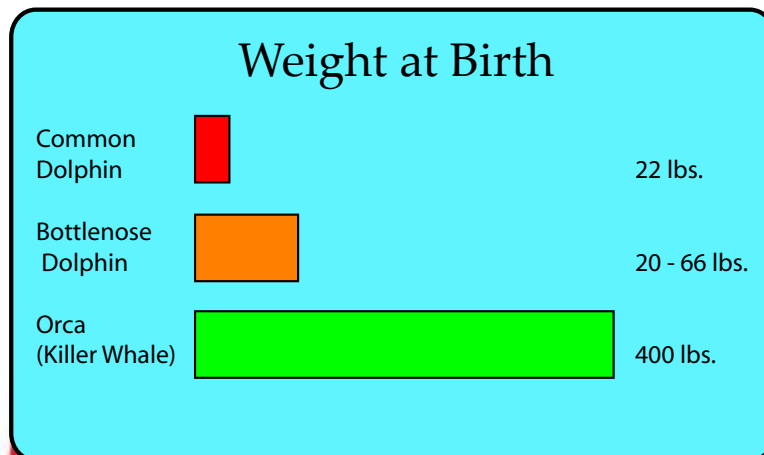


Charts and Graphs

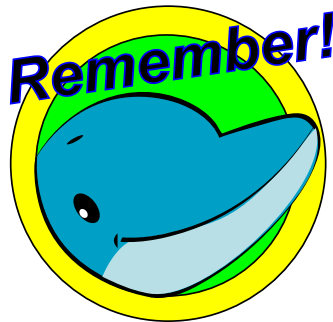
