

Future Perfect

The future perfect verb tense is the past participle tense used with *will have* or sometimes *shall have*.

Future tense: I will run.

Future prefect tense: I will have run.

The future perfect tense is used for showing an action that will be finished in the future. It usually shows some relation between two actions.

Example 1: Future tense - He *will eat* his lunch at one o'clock, so we can leave.

Meaning: He will start his lunch at one o'clock which allows us to leave.

Example 2: Future perfect tense - He *will have eaten* his lunch at one o'clock, so we can leave.

Meaning: He will have finished his lunch before one o'clock which allows us to leave.
